OUR LEGACY & VISION

The Friends of Haleakalā National Park (FHNP) began in 1996 through the vision of Mary Evanson. Through our formalized partnership with the National Park Service, we have grown into a vital support pillar—He Pouhana No Haleakalā—for Haleakalā.

For over 25 years, volunteers have been the heart of our organization, contributing thousands of hours to preserve and protect Haleakalā. Our work spans from maintaining historic cabins deep within the crater to supporting native plant restoration and removing invasive species.



Over the decades, we have safely guided hundreds of volunteers into the park and trained countless service leaders to tread lightly while making a lasting difference in this sacred place

Our commitment extends beyond hands-on service. Through our memorial scholarship program, we honor key figures like Don Reeser, Mary Evanson, and Dr. Fern Duvall while supporting young people pursuing studies in ecosystem preservation. Our financial support provides the park flexibility to address needs beyond federal funding, particularly for endangered species programs.

This legacy of service inspired our refreshed mission: "FHNP fosters strong relationships between Maui's diverse communities and Haleakalā National Park through service, volunteerism, and education. We do this in order to preserve, protect, and promote the ecological and cultural heritage of this special place."

Our vision remains clear: "We envision a diverse community connected to Haleakalā through service."

OVER THE YEARS, FHNP HAS:

- Established and maintained a robust volunteer service program
- Supported native habitat restoration and endangered species protection
- Provided crucial unrestricted funding for park initiatives
- Created memorial scholarships for future conservation leaders

IMPACT THROUGH SERVICE

This year, our volunteers demonstrated incredible dedication through 10 multi-day service trips and 4 native plant nursery days, contributing over 1,261 hours to preserve and protect Haleakalā. Often hiking over 10 miles to work sites, volunteers worked tirelessly removing invasive species such as bull thistle and fireweed. They collected seeds from native plants—including 'ūlei, pilo, koa, a'ali'i, and māmane—to support restoration efforts and landscape resilience.

COMMUNITY CONNECTIONS

Throughout 2024, FHNP strengthened its community presence through strategic participation in key Maui events, each connecting different audiences to Haleakalā's mission. Our signature 'Ua'u Night in May drew 222 visitors for an evening focused on Haleakalā's critically endangered seabirds. We extended our reach through participation in major environmental events (Earth Day, Arbor Day), cultural celebrations (Hana Taro Festival, Lā 'Ulu), and community gatherings like the Kīpahulu Heritage Walk, which welcomed 110 visitors.

At our **Annual Meeting**, Dr. Hanna Mounce with Maui Forest Bird Recovery Project (MFBRP) inspired attendees with plans for 'alalā (Hawaiian crow) reintroduction on Maui. The 'alalā is extinct in the wild, and we were excited to learn how MFBRP plan to bring it back into the forests of Haleakalā. Park staff Tom Arnold recognized our volunteers' countless contributions during the meeting.

COMMUNITY SURVEY

'We conducted a community survey in 2023 which revealed key insights about our Friends' 'ohana: they are deeply committed to environmental stewardship and value connections with fellow volunteers while learning new skills. The survey showed members prefer digital communications - especially monthly email updates - and evening/weekend activities. In 2024, the board began implementing changes to reflect these preferences.

FINANCIAL STEWARDSHIP

In 2024, FHNP received \$7,304 in revenue and had expenses of \$9,220. Our total assets at year-end were \$35,395, maintaining a healthy financial reserve.

2024 Highlights

The **Hawai'i Community Foundation** supported our resilience following the Maui wildfires with a \$500 grant for operational support. Our community showed their continued commitment through the popular **Adopt-a-Nēnē program**, which **raised \$810** to support endangered species protection.

Supporting Park Resilience

The park faced significant challenges in 2024, including closures from the Crater Road Fire. The combined impact of this fire and reduced visitor fees following the 2023 Maui fires resulted in a nearly 30% reduction in the park's regularly available budget. While Haleakalā Conservancy serves as the main philanthropic partner of the park, FHNP works in concert with both the Conservancy, Hawai'i Pacific Parks, and the park to support service-based initiatives, key programs, and endangered species protection. Through careful stewardship of our resources and continued community support, we remain committed to our role in addressing these challenges.

2025 Financial Infrastructure Updates

We're strengthening our financial systems to better serve our donors and the park. While continuing to use Network for Good for donations through 2024, we're preparing to launch an **enhanced donation management system** with our new website in 2025. These improvements will make supporting our mission more seamless.

EVANSON - REESER - DUVALL MEMORIAL SCHOLARSHIP

The Friends of Haleakalā National Park Scholarship annually honors three founders of the organization and conservation leaders- Don Reeser, Mary Evanson, and Dr. Fern Duvall- by awarding scholarships to young people entering or continuing studies that contribute to the knowledge and preservation of natural, and particularly endangered, ecosystems.

Three 2024 graduates of Maui high schools were selected as awardees for the 2024 Friends of Haleakalā National Park Memorial Scholarship:

- Emmi-Lin Felten (Kamehameha Schools Maui) Attending Pacific University Oregon
- Nyla Mullen (King Kekaulike High School) Attending University of Hawai'i at Mānoa
- Lucia McKinnon (Seabury Hall) Attending University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill

Each recipient was awarded \$1,000 to support their academic journey in fields related to the study and preservation of the natural environment.

STRENGTHENING OUR COMMUNITY MODEL

This year marked an important evolution in how we engage with our **community**. We returned to our founding vision as a **donation-based organization**, removing membership dues to ensure all are welcome to participate in our mission. Those who contribute \$30 or more are recognized as "**Friends**," though our programs and volunteer opportunities remain open to everyone who shares our commitment to Haleakalā. To support this transition, we updated our **bylaws** to reflect this more **inclusive engagement model** while maintaining beloved programs like **Adopt-a-Nēnē**.



LOOKING FORWARD

As we enter 2025, Friends of Haleakalā National Park is embarking on ambitious initiatives to deepen our community's connection with Haleakalā. A new focus this year is our 'ōhi'a seed collection program, where volunteers will learn to identify and collect seeds from different varieties of this keystone species. This initiative not only supports forest recovery but also builds crucial knowledge among our volunteer corps about Haleakalā's native flora.

Our commitment to hands-on stewardship continues to grow through a full calendar of service opportunities. With multi-day service trips and nursery days planned for every month of 2025, we aim to maximize our impact at Kīpahulu, Palikū, Kapalaoa, and Hōlua. Our volunteers engage in vital work including native seed collection, invasive species removal, and lo'i maintenance in partnership with Kīpahulu 'Ohana. Our goal is to see every service opportunity filled with dedicated volunteers, multiplying our ability to care for the park's resources.

Partnerships remain central to our mission, particularly our collaboration with the Haleakalā Conservancy. We're committed to supporting the Youth Conservation Corps program through fundraising efforts in 2025, investing in the next generation of environmental stewards. This partnership exemplifies our commitment to fostering long-term stewardship of Haleakalā.

To better serve our community, we're modernizing our digital presence with a **new website launch** in 2025. This platform will streamline donations and volunteer coordination while replacing our print newsletter with regular blog posts, allowing us to share timely updates about our work and impact. Through these improvements, we aim to strengthen the connections between our volunteers, donors, and partners.

By building stronger connections, expanding volunteer leadership, and supporting habitat restoration and endangered species protection, FHNP remains committed to caring for Haleakalā and inspiring others.
